Historic seaside cottage

Steeped in history, radiating a reserved Georgian style charm, this quarry cottage has been immaculately preserved to honour its place in the history of the Kiama Township.

Located in the highly sought after Pheasant Point headland, this home is one of six cottages built for quarry workers in 1893. Subsequent owners have thoughtfully retained the original fabric and integrity of design throughout the generations. Stone foundations, high ceilings, original high-waisted front door, double-hung windows, skillion roof and timber verandah combine to accentuate the historic character of this special property.

The Devonshire Street cottages are part of a significant period in Kiama's history, commonly referred to as "the basalt boom". Following the completion of Kiama harbour in 1876, basalt quarrying rapidly expanded and the blue metal was in high demand to meet Sydney's growing transport needs. It is thought that the street takes its name from the English county Devonshire, which was the birthplace of the original owner George Wood.
